



SPEAKER OF THE MONTH: KEITH TAYLOR

Keith Taylor will be providing a hands-on demonstration regarding preparing your plants for the upcoming show on May 28-29, 2016. His presentation will incorporate tips and great ideas for appropriately preparing your pots, staging your plants and using top dressing. Don't miss this very important presentation!

ABOUT KEITH

Keith Taylor began collecting caudiciform succulents in 1991 after seeing a large *Cyphostemma juttiae* in the ground at a local botanical garden. "I was drawn to size and grotesque shape of the trunk". The *Cyphostemma* he saw is also the 1st succulent he purchased. His collection is more than 800 plants. He grows in plastic pots and raised beds. Keith prefers his succulents to look like habitat specimens rather than cultivated plants. He grows them hard, meaning limited water, little to no feeding and hot sun to give them the look of collected plants.

His favorites include *Cyphostemma*, *Fockea*, *Fouquieria*, *Pachypodium*, *Pachycormus*, *Tylecodon*, *Othonna*, *Pelargonium*, *Mesemb*s and *Euphorbia*. Roughly 5% of his collection is tuberous rooted cacti, *Lophophora*, *Peniocereus*, *Turbinicarpus*, *Mammillaria*, *Leuchtenbergia* and *Ariocarpus*.

In 2008, Keith began creating pots to show off his plants. He believes the pot should compliment, not distract. The main focus should be the succulent. If the pot is too ornate, colorful, or shiny, it draws your eye toward the pot rather than the succulent. Also proportion plays a role. The container needs to be the right width and depth to look balanced. For example if the succulent is placed in the center of the container surrounded by colorful stones it will look artificial and awkward. Rocks and top dressing add to complete the presentation. His pottery is sought after by C&S collectors as well as bonsai artists due to the natural look of the containers.

CCCSS: LAST MEETING RECAP

At 2:00 pm on Sunday, March 13, 2016, Vice-President **Kathie Matsuyama** opened the general membership meeting by thanking the people who contributed to the break snacks by offering them a succulent in thanks. Kathie then invited the seven first-time visitors to introduce themselves and choose a succulent as a welcome gift.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: **Charles Varni** presented the new cards for the 2016 Show and Sale. **Kara Suzuki**, **Nick Wilkinson's** wife, designed the cards using a photo taken by **Gene Schroeder** of **Maggie and Markus'** award-winning *Astrophytum ornatum*. Members are encouraged to take some of these cards and distribute them in their communities. Charles mentioned survey results from last year's event ranking the top three reasons people came to the S&S: (1) previously attended; (2) recommended by a friend; and (3) the cards that members distributed. You can pick up cards at the next meeting to help us spread the word. **Wayne Mills** announced that he was distributing the flyers for the South County Succulent Tour on April 9. The tour will go from 10 am to 4 pm, followed by a plant exchange at Wayne's home in Arroyo Grande. Approximately fifty people have already signed up. **Rob Skillin** discussed the S&S. The goal for the 2016 show is for every member to enter their favorite plant. He encouraged people who have never entered a plant to compete as a Rookie. He is also encouraging seed-grown plants, and entering an educational exhibit, for which there is a special award if Rob is advised of the entry in advance. Last year there were too few boxes, and lots of scrambling around for more. **PLEASE SAVE BOXES AND BRING THEM TO THE FRIDAY EVENING S&S SETUP.** **Terry Skillin** reported that the hypertufa workshop was fun and that she and **Terrie Leivers** plan to have another workshop in Fall. The thank-you trip for S&S volunteers will be on Saturday, June 25, to Lotusland, with a special lunch and shopping. Volunteers will take the trip for a greatly subsidized cost and will have first chance at signing up. To volunteer for the S&S, please contact **Pat Gilson**, the volunteer coordinator. **Christy Keeling** offered the opportunity to sponsor a special S&S award for \$30. **Carol Mortensen** announced the t-shirt contest, and a design by **Mark Woods** was selected from the many creative submissions. – an *Aloe plicatilis*. Volunteers are needed for the Arroyo Grande Plant Exchange on July 23. Please contact **Terrie Leivers**.

Rob is still experimenting with projecting the plants he describes onto the large screen, so the Plant of the Month and Brag plants were relocated to the front of the room. Each month gets better. Rob highly suggests that the plants he provides (raffle and thank you) be repotted because his primary vendor is known for growing his plants in extremely porous material that requires more watering. He discussed lithops, which are sprouting their new leaves right now. Don't water them until the old (outer) leaves wither. After discussing the POM and Brag plants, the meeting took a break.

Before the special presentation, Kathie announced that **Keith Taylor** will be our speaker at the April meeting and will demonstrate getting plants ready to enter in a show. She then introduced **Tom Glavich**, a frequent author in the CSSA journal column To the Point. He showed us photos of a tour he took to the Drakensberg Mountains located in Lesotho and South Africa. Tom toured in January, summer in the Southern Hemisphere, with some bulb enthusiasts. The country of Lesotho has the unique characteristic of being completely surrounded by the country of South Africa. All the land in Lesotho is owned by the King. The main source of income is hydroelectric power they sell to South Africa. The primary crop is corn, and their diet consists of lots of cornmeal with vegetables and lamb in dark sauce ... that's what Tom ate. Many of the subjects live in primitive huts.

Following some questions and answers, the meeting adjourned.

PLANT OF THE MONTH: PELARGONIUM

On streets across America homeowners grow showy colorful Pelargonium hybrids in their flower beds. In cold weather regions these are annuals but in the lucky warmer weather areas they will live forever with good care. Non-experts incorrectly call these plants Geraniums. They aren't too far off as both belong to the family Geraniaceae. The name Pelargonium comes from the Greek "pelargo" meaning stork because of the shape of the seed pods; they are also called "Storksbill". The seeds are small and feathery. Pelargoniums are in the family Geraniaceae but are not to be confused with Geraniums which are called "Cranesbill" also named for the shape of their seed pods. Pelargoniums and Geraniums differ greatly in seed and flower form. Pelargoniums tend to have small delicate five petaled flowers, such as *P. alternans*, with some brightly colored varieties. Some species have ornamental leaves ranging from round flat velvety leaves to spindly and lacy leaves. The plant form can vary from subterranean tubers that can be raised for effect to thick stemmed shrublets such as *P. laxum* and *P. klinghardtense*.

The first known pelargonium to be cultivated in Europe, more than 200 years ago, was *P. triste*, a tuberous rooted plant which could withstand long voyages by ship. Thousands of cultivated varieties of pelargoniums selected for their desirable characteristics were originally from a few native species of South Africa pelargoniums. What few people realize is that there are a large group of approximately 200 true species Pelargoniums (not hybrids) that are winter-growing succulents well suited for cultivation in California. These plants are native to the African continent from South Africa to Kenya, even to Yemen. However, almost all the succulent species come from South Africa or Namibia, with the center of diversity being the Cape region. These true species Pelargoniums are the focus of our plant of the month.

Pelargoniums are mostly winter growing succulents that are well suited for our wet-winter, dry-summer climate in California. Although they are winter growers, they should be protected from frost. And the good news is that most of these species are very easy to grow, if attention is paid to providing an environment very similar to their South African home. Some species, such as *P. echinatum* and *P. triste* are tolerant enough to be naturalized in the ground in warmer California climates when given good drainage and protected from summer watering. Many species will not go dormant if watered all summer, but the plant health and appearance both suffer. Like most cacti and succulents, when in doubt don't water!

PLANT OF THE MONTH (CONTINUED)

The potting mix for *Pelargoniums* should be well drained, with only small amounts of organic matter, if any. Fertilizer should be applied during good winter growing weather (i.e. not in the summer and not during cold, wet periods). A recommended potting mix is 50% pumice, 35% washed builders sand and 15% leaf mold based planter mix. Plants growing under these conditions will stay compact; have thick leaves, and a healthy appearance. A well grown *Pelargoniums* will have leaves that appear to float near thick, rugged stems. If given too much water and fertilizer, they will grow leggy, and the leaves will become soft, large and droop. Plants grown hard will be healthier, and better able to survive hot summers undamaged. All *Pelargoniums* need pruning to maintain size and shape. Pinching new growth will make the plants bushy, and develop good trunk structure. During the growing season they have lush green leaves and attractive flowers. Don't worry if during the summer time these plants often look like dead sticks.

Many *Pelargoniums* are self-fertile, and seed is easily collected after flowering. Most are promiscuous, and garden hybrids are easily set if more than one species is in flower at a time. Seed collected in the spring and planted in late September to November germinates quickly, and will have an entire winter to grow before going dormant during the summer.



BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING - MARCH 2016

Following the general membership meeting on March 13, 2016, the following people appeared at one time or another for a meeting of the Board of Directors. Barbara Brooks, Pat Gilson, Harry Harlow, Mary Harlow, Kathie Matsuyama, Wayne Mills, Carol Mortensen, Carol Moss, Claudette Rettig, Rob Skillin, Terry Skillin, and Maggie Wagner.

Maggie gave the Treasurer's Report. A motion was made and seconded authorizing the Treasurer to transfer the CCCSS checking account from Bank of America to Rabobank. [Later in the week two signers, Maggie Wagner, Treasurer, and Pat Gilson, Hospitality, appeared with Secretary Carol Harlow Moss (who provided the Secretary's Statement) at the Pismo Beach branch of Rabobank and arranged for a new account. The other two signers, Rob Skillin and Ken Byrne, appeared separately.] Maggie was authorized to contact a replacement bookkeeper. Barbara gave the Membership Report and said there were six new memberships and a number of renewals. Barbara reported that ten copies of the newsletter is a more reasonable amount for her to provide to members without computer access. Rob is going to use part of his A/V budget on a cordless microphone. Ann Byrne has volunteered to take care of the Library until Gene Schroeder returns. The AG Plant Exchanged was discussed. It will be a small event; three volunteers have already signed up. Terry was going to the Oakland exchange to find out how they do it. Wayne Mills discussed the organization of his plant exchange on April 9. Details of the Show and Sale were addressed. Pat Gilson reported on her research about getting a truck to transport the tables CCCSS will rent from the mineral society. Pat is authorized to rent a truck for \$39 a day and keep it all weekend. It will be used for storage of boxes, as a signboard for a parking sign, as well as transporting the tables. It was determined that there may be room for three or four extra tables in the show room at the Ludwick Center for additional sales. The CCCSS table will sell t-shirts and possibly a book. *Under the Spell of Succulents* was suggested. The board discussed organizing a no-host group dinner after the S&S on Saturday evening for participants in the S&S, particularly the vendors. It was decided to reserve a room that holds fifty at Café Roma. Rob will let the vendors know by letter about getting on the dinner list. There will probably be another hyper-tuffa workshop in Fall, and Ann Erb may have a bonsai workshop after the S&S, possibly in August. Another workshop to make succulent-filled pumpkins at the end of September is a possibility. Melany Shapiro is considering a wreath workshop. Terry Skillin is working on the Lotusland trip and catered lunch (e.g., pizza/tacos) at a special garden. There will probably be a stop at a nursery. Other activities were suggested, including a possible mid-week shopping trip. Ken Byrne has appointed a Nominating Committee. Carol Moss was given a budget of \$100 for purchasing new sign frames. Carol Mortensen will put a notice in the newsletter about the availability of t-shirts. The board selected a neutral shade for Mark Woods' design. The meeting adjourned at 6:00 pm.
