CCCSS November Meeting Recap

There was a good turnout for the November meeting, during which we discussed the **December pot-luck dinner**; sign-up sheets were available. In place of the usual meeting format, a festive meal is planned, with turkey and ham provided by the club and members bringing the rest of the fixin's. There will be two auctions, one live and one silent. **Members are encouraged to enter their show-quality plants in the live auction** – the plant's owner will get 75 percent of the proceeds, with the remaining 25 percent going to the club. Items in the silent auction are donated (and a tax deduction) and can include anything plant-related, including books, pots and artwork. **Volunteers are needed on Sunday, December 11, at 1:30 p.m. to help set up for the party and also clean up afterward.**

Old Business: The positions of newsletter editor and secretary still need to be filled and other board positions will become available as our current officers look forward to retiring someday. We are still looking for ideas and volunteers (especially volunteers!) for our prospective community outreach projects. Suggested projects include developing a speaker program and creating a public display. Looking ahead: this year we will be able to set up for our annual show on Friday night; please let **Pat Gilson** know if you can help before 5 p.m. on May 25.

Charles Spotts educated us about the Plant of the Month – Ariocarpus, and members provided outstanding examples of these cacti. Charles' article in last month's newsletter is very comprehensive, and he and Rob Skillen (who has been growing them for 30 years and is an expert on Ariocarpus) added that the plant should not be allowed to get too tall in cultivation. In habitat they are very flat to the ground. Rob noted that Ariocarpus seem to do better in SLO than when he grew them in Bakersfield, probably because our hot days are followed by cool nights, a climate preferred by most cacti. Rob says Ariocarpus respond well to more root room and grow faster in a larger pot, but repotting can disturb their roots and can set back their growth a few years. They like water in summer when they are growing, but should not be watered between now and May. A website [locate by entering living rocks in browser] covers Ariocarpus and is recommended for further reading.

November's speaker, **Gregg DeChirico**, gave an entertaining travelogue/slide show of a recent expedition to Peru. Rather than presenting a technical lecture, Gregg described his presentation as a "plant geek's version of What I Did on Summer Vacation." Gregg recently became enamored with Tillandsia and found and photographed many of these epiphytes in his travels around Peru, as well as multitudes of flora and fauna of the region. He admitted that his previous dismissive attitude toward peperomia was changed by the amazing varieties he came across on his trip. He relayed the interesting fact that the residents of each town in Peru wear hats with a distinctive style that distinguishes them from the residents of other towns. Gregg recommended a book by Wade Davis – One River – describing the ethnobotany, past and present, of the Peruvian tributaries of the Amazon River.



Ficus Palmeri




Succulent Compositae

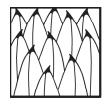
