November Speaker

J.D. Wikert <u>AMAZING ADROMISCHUS</u>

J.D. is a fisheries biologist with the US Fish and Wildlife Service working on restoration of habitat for salmon in the Central Valley and lives in Lodi California. Previously, he worked in Florida sampling fish and doing lake restoration. He is a self-trained succulent hobbyist and usually has more than

100 flats of plants in his back (and side) yards. J.D. has been actively propagating succulent plants for over 15 years and has figured out how to kill most succulent species over that time period. He is a member of both the Sacramento and Stockton Cactus and Succulent Societies, and is currently the president (in absentia) for the Stockton Club which plans to resume in person meetings in February.

J.D. presented to the club previously on Stapeliads back in the pre-pandemic days. J.D. will provide a broad overview of the genus Adromischus. The talk will include information regarding taxonomy, distribution, cultivation, and propagation as well as providing pictures of some of the more readily available or interesting species.



While J.D. prefers to make his talks interactive, the virtual format makes that more challenging. Hopefully, we will be able to cue up people with questions throughout the presentation.

J.D. will bring sale plants, but you won't be able to purchase any because the meeting is virtual. :) Here's hoping we get back to normal soon.

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Haemanthus albiflos

Family: Amaryllidaceae

Common names: white paint brush (Eng.); witpoeierkwas (Afr.); umathunga (Xho.); uzaneke (Zul)

Introduction

Haemanthus albiflos is the best known of the three evergreen species of Haemanthus: with its handsome leaves, long flowering season and red berries it is an excellent choice for shady spots in the garden.

Description

H. albiflos is a very variable plant growing up to about 10 inches tall when in flower. The oblong leaves vary in color from pale to dark green or greyish-green and are usually smooth and sometimes shiny. They may occasionally be covered with short, soft hairs, or have yellowish spots on the upper surface. The upper half of the bulb is usually exposed above ground and is bright green.

This plant has a long flowering period extending from early Autumn to as late as the end of Winter in the wild, but sporadic blooms may also appear at any time of the year under cultivation. The flower head

[known as an umbel] is compact, about 1 – 2 inches wide and consists of numerous erect, narrow white flowers enclosed by several broad, greenish-white bracts. The erect stamens protrude conspicuously beyond the tips of the flowers and their anthers turn bright yellow or orange when ripe. The ripe fruit is a most attractive bright orange or red fleshy berry producing a distinctive musty odor.

Distribution and Habitat

Haemanthus albiflos has a mainly coastal distribution stretching from the Cape of South Africa through many parts of the eastern cape. Unlike most other *Haemanthus* species, which prefer full sun, *H.albiflos* almost always occurs in shady habitats in forests.

Haemanthus is a most interesting, endemic southern Africa genus comprising approximately 22 species, the vast majority of which occur in South Africa, in particular the arid region of central and western Namaqualand. All the species are bulbous geophytes with perennial fleshy roots and produce a dense clusterof red, pink or white flowers.

The species from the western parts of southern Africa are all Winter growing with a distinct summer dormant period. Those from the summer rainfall parts are mostly summer-growing and dormant in winter, but there are also three evergreen species in this region, namely *H. albiflos, <u>H.</u>* <u>deformis</u> and *H. pauculifolius*.

PLANT OF THE MONTH - Continued

Derivation of Name and Historical Aspects

The name *Haemanthus* is derived from the Greek *haima* meaning blood, a reference to the red flowers of most species, and *anthos* meaning flower. *Albiflos* refers to the white flowers of this particular species.

Ecology and Uses

Bees and butterflies visit the flowers and are probably the pollinators, but this has not been confirmed.

This plant is reported to be used in traditional medicine to treat chronic coughs and as a charm to ward off lightning.

Growing Haemanthus albiflos

H. albiflos It is an ideal plant for a shady rock garden or for difficult parts of the garden. It is one of the easiest of all the *Haemanthus* species to grow. It requires a dappled shade position similar to that preferred by clivias, and likes to remain undisturbed for many years once established. The soil medium must be well aerated. It also makes an excellent subject for containers, these need not be deep as the roots naturally spread out horizontally. Plants like to become potbound and mature bulbs flower reliably every year, and only need to be divided every seven or eight years.

Send your questions to our venerable expert Cactophile Gene Schroeder and Succulentophile Kathie Matsuyama. Due to the overwhelming number of ASK ME requests, you must be an <u>Active Member of CCCSS</u> to participate.

Examples of issues we may be able to help with include:

• ID of Plants

Provide 3 photos of the plant: 1) close-up of leaves, flowers, spines; 2) general photo of the plant with something in the photo that indicates scale....a ruler, soda can or credit card; and 3) a photo of the plant in its environment (is the plant in full sun, under a porch, planted in the landscape?)

- Watering & Light Requirements
- Feeding & Fertilization
- Pests & Problems
- Soil & Amendments
- Propagation

Please email good photos of your plant. Also provide all the background information you think necessary to help us answer your question. Tell us which city you live in; microclimates in our region provide vastly different growing conditions. We will email you with our thoughts. Your plant question might be featured in a future CCCSS ASK US Newsletter column.

Notes From Our Library: What's That Plant?

As gardeners, many of us have found that when trying to identify a particular plant, the best source is another gardener! However, if an expert is not available, we turn to other sources like books or even cell phones. Yes, there are apps for our cell phones that can easily be used for plant identification. You take a picture, and the app attempts to identify the plant.

Three free apps that you can try are:

PlantNet: This app's description claims that it can recognize over 20,000 species. It is available for both I-Phone and Androids. Tutorials on how to use the app are available on YouTube.

Plant Snap: This app claims that it can identify 90% of all known species of plants. (This free version contains ads. You must pay for the ad-free version.) It is available for both I-Phone and Androids.

iNaturalist: This is a website and app. The app is available for I-Phone, and can be accessed through Google Play on Androids. One difference with this app is that identifies both plants and animals. It was developed as a joint initiative of the California Academy of Sciences and National Geographic. There is a good tutorial of how to use it on YouTube.

Marni Turkel (pronounced tur KELL) is a native of the San Francisco Bay Area and has been growing orchids since 1980. She grows in four greenhouses in Santa Rosa with approximately 1250 sq ft of growing space. Her main interest is in miniature species but plenty of larger plants have crept into the collection as well. Marni has been a contributor to Orchids magazine with her series called 'Well Worth the Space' and 'Give It a Rest'. Her articles have been translated into Dutch, German, Portuguese and Swedish for international publication. Photographs of her plants have been feature in articles noted orchid publications including Orchids Magazine, Orchid Digest, Richardiana, The Orchid Review,



and The Australian Orchid Review. For the last few years she has been sharing her photographs and knowledge on <u>OrchidsForum.com</u>.

Starting in 2009, Marni expanded her work with orchids to include propagation of orchids from seed and has set up a flasking lab of her own to take the process from start to finish and sell flasks of many of the orchids species in her collection. After working for over 43 years as a potter, she has retired from ceramics to pursue orchids full-time.

A Prickly Proposition

THE SILER PINCUSHION IS A RARE AND

rather particular cactus. Currently listed as threatened by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the spiny, pineapple-sized plant occurs only across a narrow band of desert in southwestern Utah and northwestern Arizona. Some of its limited habitat falls within The Nature Conservancy's 800acre White Dome Nature Preserve in St. George, Utah; some of it falls in an adjacent area slated for development.

To protect that stronghold of succulents from being bulldozed, TNC relocated 91 healthy specimens to its preserve a couple of hundred yards away. But the transfer was a painstaking process: The spiked orbs are tricky to handle, and volunteers and botanists had to carefully dig a large radius around each plant to preserve its long, thin roots, which grow laterally to optimize water absorption during the region's infrequent rain showers.

"It's really important that we try to save them," says Elaine York, west desert regional director for TNC in Utah, noting that other threats to *Pediocactus sileri* include off-road vehicle use and disturbance from mining and mineral exploration. The transplanted cohort will be monitored over the next two years in hopes that at least 60% will survive. Regardless of how many do, though, the project's impact will endure, York says. "It will help inform future efforts to relocate rare plants and preserve biodiversity." –C.Z. ROOT LENGTH Up to 3 feet long



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


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
