Our Guest Speaker:

Ron Parker, "Agaveville"



Ron Parker will be speaking on "The Search for Ancient Agave Cultivars Across the Desert Southwest", which ties SW archaeology to agaves in a very meaningful way. It's actually a really fun subject that considers an aspect of agave distribution few have considered. He will give a quick backdrop on the ancient cultures that developed these agave cultivars, as well as their reasons for doing so, before going deep and examining the plants themselves, and then finally considering their fate.

SPEAKER OF THE MONTH —Continued

Ron Parker is an outdoorsman, xeric plant enthusiast, and amateur botanist who spends half his time gardening and the other half exploring natural habitat across Arizona and neighboring states, primarily chasing agaves and archaeological sites. He has been studying agave populations in Arizona for many years, and has been out in the field with renowned botanists and regional archaeologists.

Named for Joachim Burser (1583-1639) Danish botanist




The genus Bursera includes 100 species of shrubs and trees native to the Americas distributed in tropical forests from Southern USA and the Caribbean islands to Northern Argentina. More than 80 species are found in Mexico and half of these are from the states of Guerrero, Michoacán and Oaxaca. Several species are succulent with thickened, pachycaul trunks swollen with water-bearing tissues.

Many species of Bursera have aromatic resins in their bark and wood which are released when rubbed. Bursera microphylla is one of the most aromatic members of this genus.


These low spreading trees grow up to 10 feet tall with thickened succulent trunks, often twisted, whose green bark becomes white-ochre and peels in papery strips. The pinnate leaves have 3 - 15 leaflets and are produced as a response to rain. The bark and leaves are highly aromatic, similar to camphor, with a resin that can be collected for use as an incense similar to myrrh. Five-petalled creamy-white flowers appear in early Summer.

Bursera microphylla is distributed from South-Western Arizona and California into Baja California and the Mexican state of Sonora. A significant group of Elephant Trees grows at the bottom end of the Anza Borrego Desert State Park, California. The aromatic resins discourage predation by herbivores and were used in traditional medicine and as a sealant for boats and pottery.

 - Thanks to members for paying dues and for attending meetings

 - Budgeting will be the topic of discussion at today's BOD meeting.

- Today's speaker was Jeff Chemnick from Santa Barbara's "Aloes in Wonderland". His home was destroyed during the Tea Fire in 2008 and his gardens were severely impacted. He has since rebuilt his home and surprisingly most of the gardens recovered. He took us on a tour of the fantastic garden. - Budgetary items were discussed:
 - The Odd Fellows have reduced our rent again since we have gone back to Zoom meetings. We can still use the parking lot for our plant giveaways & other activities.

 - Kathy Goss, Treasurer reviewed our expected income/ expenses for the coming year. Financially we are doing OK for now. Membership & vendor sales at the plant giveaways & a possible plant auction will generate some income. Hopefully next year we will be able to have some version of a Show & Sale.

ASK ME TABLE ANSWERS:

SHOULD I BE WORRIED ABOUT AGAVE SNOUT WEEVILS & GRUBS?

The topic of agave snout-nosed weevils came to the attention of the **Virtual ASK ME Table** last week. Debra Lee Baldwin recently circulated an email regarding snout-nosed weevils and grubs. YIKES! It got our attention. If you are not aware of this serious and rapidly spreading new succulent pest, please keep reading and be sure to watch Debra Lee's YouTube video on this topic!

ARE YOU INFESTED? Debra Lee's new video shows how to tell at a glance if an agave is under attack, how to test how bad it is with your fingertips, and what to do when this global menace finds your prized succulents...or your next-door neighbors'.

GET THE WORD OUT: Copy and paste the alert from Debra Lee's webpage onto your neighborhood forum and send it to garden club members and friends who might benefit.

GARDEN PEST ALERT: The agave snout-nosed weevil spreads rapidly and kills large succulents. Don't wait for signs of infestation; take preventative measures now to protect your agaves, furcraeas (an agave relative), beaucarneas (ponytail palm), yuccas and mangaves. Please keep your yard from becoming a weevil breeding ground! Learn more:

DEBRA LEE'S YouTube VIDEO: In her video, "Agave Snout Weevil Prevention and Treatment," Debra Lee demonstrates how to inspect nursery agaves, shows resistant varieties, and interviews agave expert Kelly Griffin at an infested colony of *Agave americana*. Kelly also talks about applying a systemic insecticide as a prophylactic (preventive) option.

The weevil---once prevalent only in desert regions and Mexico---is spreading rapidly throughout the US and abroad, earning it the dubious distinction of being one of the "Top 100 Worst Global Invasive Species."




